Lessons in Leadership



FAHD'S BIO



Fahd co-initiated the York Street ULTIMATE March Break Camp. This week-long camp is for low-income, visible minority children between the ages of 6 and 12 who reside in Lowertown, Ottawa. Under his leadership, the team was able to raise \$19,000 for the camp over its first

three years of operation. The camp provided over 100 kids with a camp experience at no cost. For his efforts, Fahd was recognized with a United Way Community Builder Award and was named one of Canada's Top 20 Under 20 by the Youth in Motion organization.

OWL: How did you get involved with helping children?

Fahd: My family moved to Canada from Kuwait in 1998. When we first started out here, I was considered an at-risk child because we lived in a fairly rough community, we were a low-income household, and we had a big family, with six kids. I was lucky enough to live only ten minutes away from a Boys and Girls Club in Ottawa. The club was a community centre with a gym, pool, and art centre, and it had fun activities to do. The club taught me how to be part of the community and how to give back. I eventually joined the youth council and did things like help out with the Christmas and Halloween parties. The club became an integral part of who I was. It inspired me to coach soccer and run a number of youth council projects.

OWL: How did you raise \$19,000?

Fahd: I was lucky enough to be able to learn about fundraising from the Boys and Girls Club and Child and Youth Friendly Ottawa (CAYFO). When I was 14 years old, I joined a leadership program. Someone there told me I had great natural leadership ability, so I was invited to sit on the board of directors. My experience through those organizations helped me understand fundraising. In grade 12, I went to visit my old public school. After that visit, my friend Muhammad Zaman and I brainstormed, and we decided to run a March break camp. There were no funds available, and the community seemed taken aback at first that we were determined to do this. We managed to raise a lot of money from companies, and camp staffers were entirely volunteer. We were able to provide an awesome camp experience to one of the lowest-income communities in Ottawa.

OWL: What does it take to be a leader?

Fahd: Leadership is bigger than ourselves. Most people don't identify themselves as leaders, but everyday things can make a difference. The biggest leaders I've had in my life saw something they wanted to change and went and did something about it. So the secret is simple: identify a problem and do something about it. Don't get discouraged about how big the problem is—have faith in your actions as a leader.

OWL: What are your plans for the future?

Fahd: I'm currently studying political science and economics at Carleton University. I'm really interested in politics for the community—basically, politics with a purpose. My family struggled when we first came to Canada, and now we consider ourselves fairly successful. I want to help new families come to Canada and to make it easier for people who are struggling.
